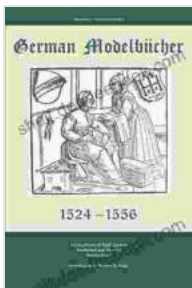

German Modelbücher 1524-1556: A compilation of eight German needlework and weaving pattern books

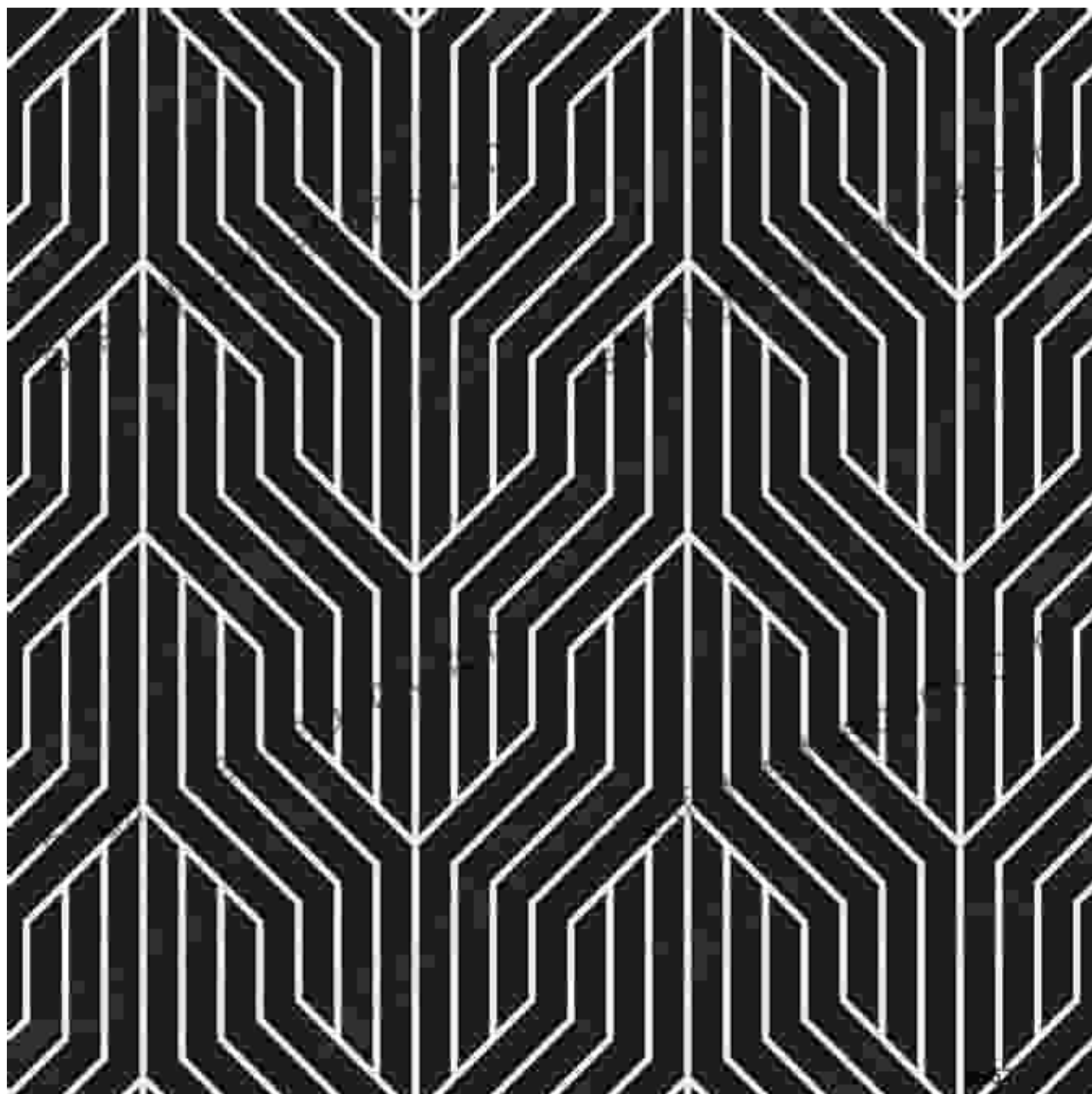

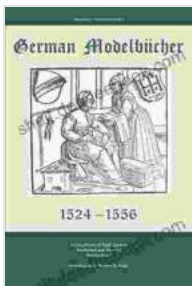
Pattern 8: Religious Motifs

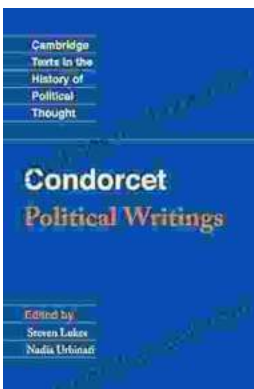
