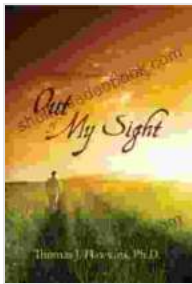


Out of My Sight: The Biblical Response to Death and Grief

How to Grieve

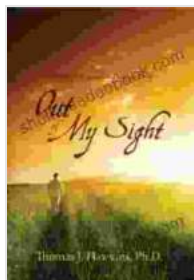
There is no one right way to grieve. Everyone grieves differently, and there is no set timeline for how long it will take to heal. However, there are some things that can help you through the grieving process:
