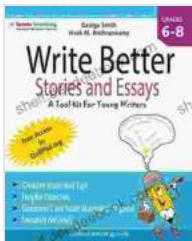


Unveiling the Common Core State Standards (CCSS): A Comprehensive Guide for Educators, Parents, and Students

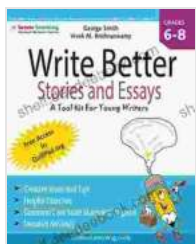

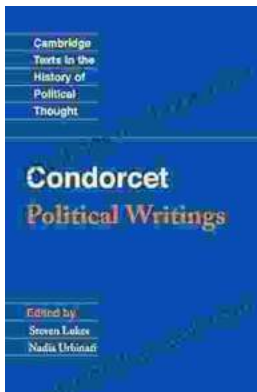


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
